
Primary Three-Way Conferences: An opportunity for reflection about learning

The Three-Way Conferences are just two weeks away. As you will have seen on the school calendar this semester's conferences are being held the afternoon of Wednesday, **4 October** and during the day of Thursday, **5 October**. You should have already received an invitation with the scheduled time of your child's conference. The conference schedules are also posted on the class blogs. (*Please note that Thursday*, <u>5 October</u> is <u>not a normal school day</u>. Children only come to school for their conferences.)

What can I expect to happen during the conferences?

The Three-Way conference includes and involves the learner, teacher and parent, so it is very important that your child attends the conference with you. During the

Kelsey Daignault Middle School - Humanities



conferences the students will discuss their learning and understanding with their parents and teacher. The parent's and teacher's roles are to support the student through this process. Prior to the conferences, the students will be reflecting upon their work and selecting samples that they would like to share during the conference. In addition to sharing of the student's work, the conference is also a time for the student, parent(s) and teacher to collaboratively identify the student's strengths, as well as areas for improvement, followed by support for any new goals set.



Where will the conferences take place?

The conferences will be held in the child's Homeroom classroom and are scheduled for <u>20 minutes</u>. While conferences with the Single Subject teachers haven't been scheduled, you are <u>strongly encouraged</u> to visit and meet with these various teachers in their classrooms as their subjects are an equally important part of your child's learning. Please do plan to take time to visit with the Art, Drama, French/Portuguese, Music, and P.E. teachers.

Is there school on Friday, 6 October?

Yes. Children are expected to be in school on Friday, 6 October. The day finishes at the normal dismissal time of 13:30. The children will be reflecting on the conference experience and making plans for achieving the goals that were set during the conference. They will also be finishing up any unit related work and bringing closure to the term.

In next week's Oryx, I will share some suggestions for how you can prepare for your children's conferences and the kinds of questions you might ask.

What's going on the in the PYP?


Dear parents

The Primary Years Programme fosters a language rich learning environment. In the PYP we work from a developmental and constructivist approach. We believe in building on foundational blocks to support further academic learning.

What do you think are the key PYP understandings about language learning?

Our focus is to ensure language is:

- Connected
- Coherent
- Meaningful



Language as a discipline can be immersed and integrated through inquiry based exploration and the concept driven curriculum.

When exploring language for reading, we believe children need time to acquire certain foundational understandings as they start to read:

Toddlers, KG 1 & KG 2: The Purple reading blocks- Print concepts

- Children are learning to handle and explore books (turning pages)
- They start to recognise that print conveys meaning
- They are exposed to text format from left to right
- Can connect to visuals and knows parts of a story

`KG 2 & Year 2 The Yellow reading blocks - Alphabetic system: Phonemic Awareness - Phonics

- Exploring environmental sounds
- Becoming aware of letters and sounds in my name
- Reads CVC words and knows most sounds of letters
- Names upper and lowercase letters

KG 2 through to Year 1 and 2: The Orange reading blocks - Alphabetic system: Phonemic Awareness - Phonics

- Starts with the big introduced to a sentence "The cat is black".
- Learns to identify and break down the words in a sentence segment.
- Explores the idea of compound words and segments these "rain-
- Explores the words and breaks them into syllables e.g. A/lex.
- Starts to be introduced to letter sounds "ssss" and identify things that start with this sound.
- As letter sounds are introduced they start to blend the sounds to make words.



Summer has arrived ...

It is getting hot now and we can get rid of jackets, jerseys, long pants and all those heavy clothes. This is in itself a pleasant experience.

However, how do we present ourselves in our community?

Each year, when it gets hot, we find ourselves asking whether our dress code should be more prescriptive. Should we wear some kind of uniform? Should we tell students what to wear and what not to wear?

And every year, there are some situations where there is disagreement and disappointment among students and staff about what is appropriate to wear to school and what is not acceptable. There is no right answer, but there can be guidelines. How specific should guidelines be?

Here at WIS we are proud of the diversity we have in every respect. Students and families represent different cultures, religions, levels of society, belief and values. How far do we restrict certain expressions of self in order to accommodate each other? I do not have the answer for that. But, we need to respect each other, and respect is mostly expressed in the way we treat each other - in our words, and articulation of ourselves toward each other, in our actions towards each other and in the way we accept each others' differences.

We are currently looking at creating guidelines for a dress code for Secondary students. What would you think is appropriate? What would you put in a list of guidelines for appropriate dress in school?

I would very much appreciate the input of parents and students in determining in how far we want to prescribe what students wear. We want to leave our young people to express themselves through the way they dress. We value diversity and individuality. But we need to keep in mind that the diversity and individuality also asks us to be aware of others and to take their beliefs and opinions into consideration. Only then can we celebrate the individuality and diversity in our community.

I would welcome some feedback from students and parents on this topic in order for us to try to accommodate the views of many different people in designing an acceptable procedure to follow (mreiff@wis.edu.na).

German Classics Meet Namibia

The College of the Arts (COTA) through the Namibian National Symphony Orchestra (NNSO) is pleased to present this new musical project where Namibian and German music and musicians are performing together as part of the German Weeks program. Since we have noticed that in the last decades classical music is remaining a marginal actor in the cultural Namibian life, we have developed a new approach for bringing the astonishing landscape of the greatest European composer nearer to the Namibian culture.

We do not want to present the 'better music' and pretend that it is the only owner of true beauty, we want to prepare a 'meeting' between two cultural traditions: a sort of 'Date between two Persons that do not know each other yet'.

On 22 and 23 September the NNSO, under the capable hands of Alexander Fokkens, will start the program with the Mozart Concertante in Eb major. Jürgen Kriess and Enrico Palascino will be the violin and viola soloists. Two young Namibians, Eike Coetzee and Ronaldo Kandume, take the German journey further by performing as soloists in the Beethoven Romance in F major. The final items of the program bring the music back to Namibia, when Lyvodia #Ouses and Eslon Hindundu will perform Namibian songs with orchestral accompaniment.

The generous sponsorship of the Konrad Adenauer Foundation in Namibia made it possible that the Musai Quartet from Germany will be part of the NNSO. Other sponsors are the German Embassy in Namibia and Schenker Logistics, as well as private sponsors.

- You will receive emails stating the teacher's name and time that the appointment is at.


