PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Next week, the Year 6 classes will be venturing to Out of Nature for a two-night/three-day excursion. The students will be accompanied by Ms Kaye, Ms Lyndsay, Mr Gerson, Mr B, Ms Christalien and me. The purpose of this trip is for team building prior to the upcoming PYP Exhibition. For many of the children, this will be their first time away from home, while others have had experience being away from home. No matter the experience, this trip will be an opportunity for the children to further develop independence and self-confidence.

Since the Exhibition requires collaboration and teamwork, the focus of the three days will be team building. Through participation in the various activities, which the teachers will be leading, the children will use

creative thinking to solve problems as a group. These activities, encourage the use of cooperation, communication and social skills, while working towards a common goal or objective. In the process the children will be able to share their own ideas as well as experience the art of compromise and letting go of their own ideas. They will gain practice in learning to respect another person's point of view even if it differs from their own. Of course during the three days they will have fun too.



All of the skills mentioned above will be required for the Exhibition. The students will most likely be working with someone who isn't a friend and perhaps they don't know well. It will be important for the students to communicate and collaborate with one another to meet the requirements and achieve their goals. Hopefully, the trip to Out of Nature and participation in the various activities will help to reinforce for the students what it means to be collaborative and to work as a team.

SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

WIS is an inclusive school - What does that mean?

WIS is proud to be an inclusive school and Namibia's educational system is an inclusive system. But what does it mean to be an inclusive school? What is inclusive education?

According to Richard A. Villa and Jacqueline S. Thousand in their book **Creating an Inclusive School** inclusive education is: ... about embracing everyone and making a commitment to provide each student in the community, each citizen in a democracy, with the inalienable right to belong. Inclusion assumes that living and learning together benefits everyone, not just children who are labeled as having a difference (e.g., those who are gifted, are non-English proficient, or have a disability).

At WIS we try to celebrate differences and diversity and we try to accommodate all children in the learning experience, provided that we have the means and capacity to do justice to their needs. Children who do not speak English are supported by our EAL teachers until they are proficient enough to manage in the normal classroom without additional support. Children with other learning needs are assessed by our Learning Support Department and with the guidance of an Optimal Learning Plan, we work together to try to support the child in the classroom.

However, inclusion is an all encompassing situation and needs the commitment and input of all stakeholders in the educational process. We therefore need to be closely in touch with parents and caregivers as well as the student to try to support and assist the student to realise their potential.

This is by no means an easy and never a straightforward task. Here at WIS, we teachers often discuss ways to try to accommodate each child and maximise each child's learning abilities. What is often a bit of a challenge are expectations from either children or their parents of what is possible. Supporting children to reach their


individual potential does need everyone to be realistic about that potential. It needs us to acknowledge the challenges and opportunities all children have.

To accommodate each child in a classroom of twenty to twenty-five children, the expectation must be that all stakeholders embrace the idea of inclusion and that students, first and foremost and then teachers and parents work to include everyone. The big task, however, is on the student him/herself and his/her parents to be open to support, to work with supporting teachers and to be able to work to the best of their ability.


New Year 10 Peer
