

Education or Schooling?

What was Mark Twain getting at? What is the difference between "education" and "schooling"?

It seems to me that *education* is the opening of doors, the encouragement of critical thinking, the acquiring of knowledge, the honing of skills, the opportunity to experiment, the gaining of understanding, being encouraged to question and doubt, the growth of self-knowledge, and the experience of both success and failure.

(Well, there's more to it than that but this short list isn't a bad start.)

Schooling, however, is about training, conditioning, promoting acceptance and obedience, discouraging individuality, and stifling creativity and originality.

But isn't "schooling" what happens in schools? Alas, it often is. And alas (even more), many governments and not a few parents wouldn't have it any other way. Schools, according to them, exist to mould young people according to the prevailing orthodoxy, be it political, cultural, religious, or whatever. It tells young people what to think, not how to think.

That is why I tell people that one critical characteristic of an international school is that it is not a national school. It's a statement that at first seems banal. But the potential released by that "banal" statement is actually rather extraordinary.

Celebrating Independence Day

Yesterday, 16 March, we celebrated our annual Independence Day Assembly. Namibia will turn 27 on the 21st of March. Our celebration ventured around the independence of women and empowering people to be bold and care for the people around them. Among our presentations were two impressive drum pieces, a video about the Afternoon Activity Unsung (Her) Stories, a poem and two very eloquent MCs.

Our guest speaker was a former WIS students, Taimi Itembu. She graduated from WIS in 2003 and is still very proud to be a member of our WIS community and part of the WIS Alumni.

We would like to share Taimi's biography with our community and want to express our appreciation for her to take the time to address our students at the Independence Day Assembly.

"Taimi Itembu gained her BA Joint Major in Political Science and Psychology from St. Francis Xavier University in Canada where she focused on International Relations and Gender Psychology.



Her overall passion is the study and work around micro- and macro-economic policies, international aid regimes, and the overall effects of international organizations and non-state actors in global policy.

To date, she has fulfilled her passions by working in direct service and management with international students and residence life programmes for two years at STFX University where she advocated for the awareness on social issues of poverty, hunger and promoting tolerance through diversity campaigns to inspire global citizenship, mutual understanding and respect.

Upon her return to Namibia, she worked with various organizations, working alongside fellow WIS kids such as Ben Gorelick and Rowland Brown assisting in projects at the Institute for Public Policy Research which is an organization that is home to Namibia's thinkers in economics and politics.



While working as a Junior Consultant, she also worked as the Alumni Coordinator for the US Embassy which was a role focused on diplomatic promotion of community development, peace, democracy and stability. She worked with various community-based organizations assisting in funding campaigns for organisations such as Pots Of Hope for women living with HIV/AIDS and mentorship programmes with Young Achievers Namibia and Physically Active Youth.

Feeling like an outsider in her first 2 years in Namibia, she felt the need to blend her career

environment and took on a job working with the Planning and International Relations department at the Namibia University of Science and Technology, where she worked as the lead coordinator on large scale programmes such as the EU/Intra-ACP Programme and the planning officer to assist the Polytechnic of Namibia to implement the transformation activities towards becoming the Namibia Institute of Science and Technology.

She was later employed by the former Chairperson of the National Council where she assisted the Chairperson and advised on social and political issues, civic engagement and community economic programmes for Namibia.

To date, she is facing her biggest challenge yet, working for the Judiciary of Namibia and is part of the team that is setting up policies and in general establishing the newest Office in the Namibian State.

In addition to her academic and professional credentials, Ms. Itembu has built a successful health-and-wellness business with a fellow WIS KID, Nangado Kauluma where they advocate for health and wellness across the country. The Pulse Health and Wellness studio is home to her famous dance fitness classes and often also advises Namibian corporates on wellness programmes within the workplace.

If asked to describe her in two words, she is a dancer and smiler and she believes that the two should always be executed jointly.
