A Moving Target

One of the books I'm currently reading is a recent one by the British political commentator, Robert Peston. The other night I read:

Our schools are teaching the wrong things. They are creating a generation of young workers vulnerable to being made irrelevant and unnecessary by machines. Maths, reading and writing are vital for living, but not so much for earning a decent living, because machines can already do all basic information management and processing much faster and more accurately than us. What machines can't do – and quite possibly never will be able to do – is negotiate, build relationships, empathise, instil confidence, win trust, create great art, write moral philosophy, dream, or any of the other emotional and intuitive activities that are central both to highly paid careers and the sheer joy of being alive.

With schools ordered by governments to become sausage factories churning out students with the best exam grades, they do not spend enough time helping young people become more creative, better communicators or adept empathisers. [The move to measure] students' success back towards exam prowess and away from project work is especially nuts because it disproportionately rewards ability to memorise and meet deadlines and inadequately captures initiative and team-working.



SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

Alternatives - IGCSE, IBDP, Vocational, Academic

When students enter their final years of school, the decision on what the next step will be is a difficult, time consuming and complex decision. Do I continue with the IB Diploma? Do I use my IGCSE certification to go into a more vocational field? Do I want to study in an academic institution or do I rather want to do something more practical.

We cannot all pursue academic careers - we do not all want to pursue academic careers. But what options do we have?

I'd like to introduce to you an option that might be something to look into for some of our students once they complete their school education - CATS.

What does CATS stand for? - "Commercial Advancement Training Scheme" (http://www.catsnamibia.org/)

CATS offers a two year training programme to school leaving students who want to embark on more practical careers in their future. CATS students receive both theoretical and practical training in an institution affiliated to CATS. Students receive theoretical training four days a week and then work in a company for two days a week.

We have invited Ms. Twiitileni Nyamu who is the progamme coordinator for CATS Namibia to do a presentation to our school community on this initiative. Ms. Nyamu is a graduate of WIS, knows our school and our programmes and is very keen to cooperate with WIS to enrol our students with CATS in future.

This might be a useful information session for students who are thinking of starting a more vocational route once they have completed their IGCSE course.

Parents and students are invited to attend this information session on CATS on Tuesday the 6th of February at 18:00 in the Auditorium of the PLC.

Welcome back to a new term in the PYP. The students and teachers look well rested and ready to get going again.

We have had a lot of new families entering our school this term. So welcome to them. I hope you are all settling in well.

Just a reminder to all parents that the <u>PTA Community</u> <u>Centre</u> is a great place to visit, have a coffee and meet parents and staff, also buy the things you need for your child.

On **Thursday mornings** from 7:30 am till 8:00 am there is a more formal meet and greet to the PYP for all new parents. Myself (PYP Coordinator), Mr. Danai (Technological Coach) and Ms. Sharon (School Nurse and Counsellor), will pop down during this time to answer any questions or concerns you may have.

PYP FOCUS FOR THE NEXT SIX TO EIGHT WEEKS:

This week the teacher's will be posting the next PYP Newsletter on the classroom blogs. Every Unit of Inquiry cycle these are uploaded for parent information. Please check the class blog, as this is a great way to know what is happening in your child's learning and find out how you can support them. The following are the current transdisciplinary themes by Year level.

KG 1: How We Express Ourselves, Learners will explore and experiment with different art mediums, music/movement, visual art/creative mediums, imaginative role play as a means to express their personal feelings and ideas

KG 2: How the World Works Learners will be exploring materials and the world around them using their five senses. This will be very play based, experimental and hands on as learners develop awareness of their senses and how they help us.

Year 1:Sharing the Planet Learners will explore and experiment with the form of water and discover the function and purpose of water and why it is so important. This unit will be experimental and hands on with real life experiences. Learners will begin to become aware of our responsibility to water.

Year 2:How the World Works, Learners will be exploring, experiment with and research varying forms of energy in the world around them, this includes light, sound and heat.

Year 3:How the World Works Learners will be experimenting with various materials and matter and will be developing skills on how to apply the scientific process to their questioning and learning about the world.

Year 4:Sharing the Planet Learners will be exploring, discovering and researching living things and their

environment. There will be connections made with the ecosystems and what living things need to survive.

Year 5:Sharing the Planet Learners will be discovering earth's natural resources and human need of these resources. Learners should start to make connections with why our earth is so precious and the impact humans can have on it.

Year 6:How the World Works Learners will be exploring, researching into what is climate and how it is impacted or can be changed. There will be an exploration from a local and global perspective of our Earth and its climate, the geography, impact of climate and the need for sustainability.
