## PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

About eight weeks ago the Year 6 students embarked on their journey with the PYP Exhibition. The Exhibition is the culmination of a student's years in the Primary Years Programme. It is a collaborative inquiry project that requires students to identify, explore and investigate a real-life issue or problem. During these eight weeks the students have been synthesizing the essential elements (Knowledge, Concepts, Skills, Attitudes, Action) of the PYP, exhibiting the attributes of the Learner Profile and preparing to share their learning with the whole school community.

This year's Exhibition falls under the transdisciplinary theme of Sharing the Planet. Students have chosen to work individually or in small groups on such issues as: the effect of plastic recycling on the environment, the effect of people's eating habits on their health, poverty, natural resources, the future of fossil fuels, unequal access to education, and many more topics.

The Exhibition process provides the students an opportunity to:

- •demonstrate independence and responsibility for their own learning
- •explore multiple perspectives
- •take action as a result of their learning
- •celebrate the transition from primary to middle/secondary education.

The Exhibition would not be possible without the support of various members of the school community:

The Homeroom Teachers guide and facilitate the process of the Exhibition. This is the time that the teachers have to let go and let the students take on the responsibility, while encouraging them along the way and supporting the students as they experience the need to manage their time, meet deadlines and be organized. Ms Avril (PYP Coordinator) and Mr D (IT integrationist) have worked alongside Ms Kaye and Ms Yolandé supporting the students in the process.

The Parents support the students with organizing resources, helping with making contacts for interviews and providing transportation to the interviews. They encourage the children to meet deadlines, to remain calm and not give up.

The Mentors meet with the assigned student or group a minimum of once a week. The mentors assist the students with setting goals. They facilitate interviews, ask questions of the students about their inquiry and encourage time management and organization. The following staff members have volunteered their time to be mentors: Primary staff: Ms Barbara, Ms Beata, Ms Catherine M, Ms Christi, Mr B, Ms Genie, Ms Jan, Ms Kathleen, Mr Marc, Ms Natasha, Ms Ronel, Ms Ruby; Secondary staff: Ms Angatha, Ms Lian, Mr. Jackson-Read, Ms Urte.

The Exhibition opens Tuesday evening, 31 May when the students will have the opportunity to show their parents, teachers and other members of the community, the efforts of their hard work.

## Report time - blessing or curse

Receiving reports at the end of the year or semester can be a daunting experience. The intention, however, of sending reports home is a totally different one. Reports are sent home to parents and their children to inform them about the progress children are making in school in their different subjects.

Here at WIS, detailed reports are sent out twice a year for Secondary School students. The first report is sent in December and the next report is sent in May, ahead of the internal end of year examination.

What do we want to achieve by sending these detailed reports? First and foremost, we want to comment on students' progress through the semester to inform them of their strengths and also comment on areas that can be worked on.

What is the situation at home, when the report arrives? Do you share the report with your child, do you take time to go through the different subjects and the comments teachers made? Teachers spend a lot of time writing comments for all students they teach. This is probably the most daunting time in the year for teachers. Because we want to inform parents thoroughly

about their children's progress. We want to say what needs to say in a way that is helpful and that can make a difference to the future attitude and approach a student has in school, if necessary. We want to praise student's achievements, but we also want to make them aware of areas that need to be worked on.

Each report has three sections: the header which includes the days of the semester, absences and late arrivals. Please take a minute to look at this information. The second section is the comment and an achievement and effort grade for each subject the student is taking. The achievement is a summary of all formative and summative assessment that was done during the semester. The effort grade is an indication of the effort the student puts into his/her different subjects. The comment is intended to give information about the syllabus covered as well as the progress the student has made in the past semester. The third part is the comment of the homeroom teacher and the comment of the coordinator, which summarise the overall performance of the student. Overall, this gives a good indication of the child's progress and areas that need attention on the way forward.

Parents are strongly advised to take some time to go through these reports with their children. Reports should not be used as a punitive measure. Reports can be a great means to discuss school and different subjects and look at ways to work on aspects that need attention. By punishing your child because of their report or by rewarding them with material things, the essence of the aim this report goes missing. Taking the time and talking to each other about the report, should be the incentive and should in the end result in a positive and helpful discussion about the next term/year.

Working through reports with your child/ren can also initiate talks with specific teachers at the beginning of the next term to discuss strategies to work on certain areas that need strengthening.

Reports will be sent out to families today. Please contact the office if you have not received your report.

Transcripts capturing the grades of the different semesters (Semester 1 & Semester 2) and the final examination will be sent to families at the end of the school year on 17 June 2016.


