Far more important, I think, and far more urgent is to focus not on the school year 2019-2020 but the calendar year 2020. Sometimes you can see that change has occurred but it's hard to pin down when or how it happened. But at other times it is suddenly and blindingly obvious.

The virus is seen by some as evidence that the way we were living has been proved to be unsustainable. Meanwhile, the politics of hate and division are in the ascendant. We are falsely told that we need to see life in terms of "us and them". Discrimination and injustice remain a reality for countless millions.

None of the above is new. None of it comes as a surprise. But is 2020 the year when we actually start to do something about it?

As a school – and an international school, moreover – we have an obligation to be part of the answer.


# **Secondary's Favourite Comfort Food**

Next week Genie Albrecht will retire after three decades of service to Windhoek International School.


