We are quickly approaching the end of the school year. Below is a list of important end-of-year dates and events that I would like to share with you.

Transition to next year

Class lists as well as your child's teacher for the 2022/23 school year will be made known to you in the last week of school. Following that, children in grades EY1-2 to Grade 4 will have an opportunity to meet their new teacher during an orientation day on Wednesday the 15th of June. For Grade 5 students the Grade 6 meet-and- greet takes place next week.

There will be an end-of-year celebration and farewell assembly on Thursday June 16th. The Grade 5 students will be awarded a certificate of completion and wished good luck as they hand over the torch to Grade 4. We really hope next year this can be an event attended by the whole community, however due to rising COVID numbers this assembly will be for students and teachers only. We will make sure to take lots of pictures!

MAP Growth Testing and end-of-year reports

This year in the Primary we made targeted efforts to make sure students were fully prepared and set up for success for MAP Growth testing. Our efforts have really paid off and 95% of our students have made substantial growth. If this growth continues, we expect that as a school we will be soon on a par with the world-wide average in Maths, Language Usage and Reading.

Reports and MAP scores will be sent out by Wednesday 8th of June. The three-way conferences on the 9th and 10th of June are then an opportunity for your child to reflect on the year with you and your child's teacher.

Sports Week

The Primary Sports Department will be adapting our final sports day into a fun sports week for the last week of school. Children will be put in teams and will do a round robin tournament within their own classrooms. Time allowing, children will participate in a variety of sports including futsal, volleyball, trail run, parachute games, football and more.

It is this time of the year where transitions happen and where big changes are exciting but also causing anxiety with some of us.





Welcome to Middle School Gr. 5s!



With the Goethe Institut

As many of you know, *My Campus My Planet* was successful with our application for funding from the Goethe Institut and their Schools Go Green with Goethe initiative - <u>Schulen: Partner Der</u> <u>Zukunft (PASCH) Initiative.</u>

Part of this funding includes a workshop that Goethe will hold with our students and community members who are interested in joining. In this workshop we will get some practical gardening advice from our 'Goethe Garden Ranger'. This will include conversations on why earth works are so important in the Windhoek context and why it is necessary to study the landscape before any interventions. Students and available teachers will be engaged with marking the land and digging. We will possibly also look at more areas around school that can be uplifted through gardening.

These workshops are due to take place on the 7th and 8th June from 8am - 12pm.
