Dear WIS Community,

Solar Power Project - WIS is Committed to Treading Lightly on the Earth

On Tuesday August 9th we were able to flip the switch on the WIS Solar Energy Project. There are now 108 solar panels, each capable of producing 475 watts, on the roof of the PLC language classrooms. The cost of this project was NAD 668,718.93, and we project that the investment will pay itself back over approximately four years while reducing our school's energy costs by upwards of 80%. There are still a few final aspects of this project that are yet to be completed, so stay tuned for information about a ribbon cutting ceremony set to take place at the end of the month! Along with other energy saving efforts and the *Our Campus Our Planet* initiatives, this project shows our learning community's commitment to treading lightly on the earth.



Perimeter Fence Grant - Making our Campus a Secure and Safe Place to Learn

Thanks to a very generous grant of US\$338,800 from the US Department of State Office of Overseas Schools, we will soon break ground on a significant upgrade to our perimeter security of the WIS Campus. The construction of this new fence and integrated security system will take approximately two months to complete. The

The extended essay, thinking beyond the obvious comfort zones because of TOK, all the CAS hours; everything contributed to building a strong foundation for me personally. So despite the disappointment of my final grades, I still learnt a lot!

Thus, I've felt a compelling need to further the cause of education in my own country as well and I truly believe that education is where I feel my contribution could be of most value.

It also provides me with an opportunity to use the knowledge I have gained so far and to implement it in a creative manner while also providing the space to be able to grow exponentially as a working professional and on a personal level both and immerse further into the education domain.

This need and want to be involved in the education field in whatever manner has led me to be involved in multiple ways within this area. From teaching to developing content for children who are learning English as a second language to being heavily involved in the children's book publishing industry and publishing books in local Indian languages, authoring my own children's book in Hindi (the last language I ever thought I'd write in!) and to now being involved in developing meaningful assessments for teachers to use in schools to help understand where the learning gap of their students lie.

It's been an adventure so far and going from inhabiting the classroom in different capacities, to being at the backend of a software to help young children better their learning outcome, to publishing books; all of it has been an eye-opening and humbling experience.

Welcome to the 2022-2023 school year! Everyone in Primary is thrilled to welcome our students back to school and it has been lovely to see the smiles that have been hidden behind masks for so long! My first Oryx article of the year serves to inform you of some of the great things we have planned in the Primary School.

Building connections

It is appropriate that at the start of the year we focus on creating strong connections between students, teachers and parents. With this in mind, we have scheduled the following:

- August 15th and 16th: Team building days. Happy, safe and nurturing learning environments help children thrive and learn. All classes will be involved in fostering connections through team building activities and creating norms and essential agreements. Grade 4 and 5 will go to Farm Windhoek and other classes will remain on campus to engage in fun activities.
- August 30 and 31st: Learner Portrait of My Child Conference. These conferences
 are an opportunity for you to meet with your child's Homeroom teacher and to
 tell them anything they may need to know. Please be prepared to do all the
 talking as the more your child's teacher knows about your child the better she

Focus on wellbeing: Choir and Movement

In an effort to place emphasis on student wellbeing and building community, we are delighted that this year we are offering Choir and Movement to all Primary classes led by Mr Gerson. Mr Gerson will be working with our students on singing and movement. I am sure you will be delighted to see this happening during our assemblies to which parents will be invited this year. Expect to hear a lot of happy singing voices on campus!

Primary Learning Hub

At WIS we have an amazing learning community. We believe that a love for learning is best acquired through active modelling and leading by example. Like our students, teachers at WIS are Thinkers, Reflective, Inquirers and Knowledgeable. Last year in the Primary we worked to align our ACARA standards with the units of inquiry, to improve MAP Growth scores and to create strong foundational units for Maths and Literacy. This work will continue and our systems this year have been designed to support professional growth in these areas. In our Primary Learning Hub (what was previously the Admissions Area), teachers will meet and learn about impactful teaching and learning with our newly appointed Maths coordinator, Elsa Swanepoel and highly experienced PYP Curriculum coordinator Avril van Zyl. This year we have also set up Professional Learning Communities in which groups of teachers learn together, become experts in a given area and lead professional development for other teachers. Teachers have all identified goals for the year with which they will be supported through feedback on their practice.



As parents you are part of our learning community so please look out for Parent Workshop dates, Learning Celebrations, coffee mornings and assemblies. We are also always looking for guest speakers- please let your child's teachers know if there is anything you could offer in relation to the units of inquiry.




SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

WIS Health Hub

As though COVID hasn't kept us on our guard enough over the past two years, we now have a global outbreak of Monkeypox to contend with. The initial cluster was confirmed in the United Kingdom in May 2022. Their first case appears to have been linked to an individual with travel links to Nigeria. We started paying closer attention to the outbreak after the South African Health Minister reported the first case in SA on June 23rd this year.

The day after South Africa's announcement, Dr. Kalumbi Shangula (Namibia's Minister of Health) reported that "Namibia has not recorded a case of monkeypox but is ready to identify cases, and has the capability to confirm monkeypox through laboratory diagnosis. The public should remain calm," To date, I've not heard or seen any news to the contrary.



Further information:

- Monkeypox is a viral zoonotic disease (an infectious disease that is transmitted between species from animals to humans and vice versa) that occurs primarily in tropical rainforest areas of central and west Africa and is occasionally exported to other regions.
- Symptoms last from 2 to 4 weeks. Severe cases can occur. In recent times, the case fatality ratio has been around 3–6%.
- The clinical presentation of monkeypox resembles that of smallpox, a related orthopoxvirus infection which was declared eradicated worldwide in 1980. Monkeypox is less contagious than smallpox and causes less severe illness.
- Monkeypox typically presents clinically with fever, rash, and swollen lymph nodes and may lead to a range of medical complications. Scabs form when the skin lesions have dried, similar to chicken pox.
- The Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says monkeypox spreads in different ways. The virus can spread from person to person through direct contact with the infectious rash, scabs or body fluids; respiratory secretions during prolonged, face-to-face contact, or during intimate physical contact such as kissing, cuddling or sex; and touching items (such as clothing or linen) that previously touched the infectious rash or bodily fluids. It is also alleged that expectant mothers can spread the virus to their foetus through the placenta. The main feature of transmission of this disease is through close contact.

Is there a cure?

There is no cure for monkeypox, but some antiviral drugs may be effective in treating the disease. According to the WHO website an antiviral agent developed for the treatment of smallpox has also been licensed for the treatment of monkeypox.

Should you or a family member develop any of the above-mentioned symptoms, please see your doctor and inform the school should there be a positive outcome.

A few reminders re Covid:

It was wonderful to welcome our staff and students back to school with mask wearing now an optional precaution. We hope to avoid having to go back to 'the way things were before' and parents can help us by not sending sick (cold/flu symptoms) children to school, and informing me should anyone in the family be exposed to or develop Covid.
