


  ELLIS: Clara is a young nature

#### **DP Summary of Results:**

<u>Global Results</u>	<u>WIS Results</u>
Average points globally by IBDP Students: <b>31.98</b>	Average points obtained by IBDP Students: <b>31.0</b>

#### What the horizontal lines represent:

- "Top Tier Averages": As a general rule of thumb, top tier International Schools usually achieve an average of around 33 points in the IBDP. The Subject average for this would be around: 5.25
- "Global Average" of DP Results is: 5.12
- "WIS May 2022 Average DP Results": The who graduated from WIS in 2022 scored 31.0 total points and a mean subject grade of 4.99. These results are generally in line with WIS's historical trend.

#### **Key Take-Aways:**

- a) Emphasis on the IB Core: Our Theory of Knowledge results are in line with world averages, but our Extended Essay results are slightly below world average and have some high and low marks. Ms Carola Beyer has volunteered to coordinate the Extended Essay so that students are supported in their process for this 4000-word research essay. Our new Digital Media and Librarian Teacher Ms Jeannette Washington is offering a Grade 11 Academic Writing course which will provide some important data. The skills and approaches to learning developed from the IB Core have a benefit in all subject areas, and vice versa.
- **b) Teacher Collaboration and Planning Time:** In April 2022, the school received a full five-year reaccreditation report from the International Baccalaureate.

The IBDP evaluation report noted these **Strengths**:

1. The school demonstrates their commitment to a holistic approach to education;

2. Learning spaces are designed and used in innovative and flexible ways to reflect students' needs and interests. This was highly evident from the classroom set-up, the use of outdoor spaces for learning and multimedia platforms.

- 3. Examples of learning engagements and teaching strategies such as visible thinking routines and opportunities to practice mindfulness in class demonstrate the focus on developing students as inquirers and thinkers.

  Areas for development (only one was identified for the WIS IBDP):
- 1. Review meeting time and other resources to further enhance teachers' capacity for effective collaborative planning to ensure consistent approaches to teaching and coherence across the curriculum.
- **c) Teacher Office Hours and After School Support:** Identify times where students are expected to connect with teachers for doubt-clearing sessions and academic support. Schedule "Academic Catch-up Times" after school where students must attend if they fall behind on any given internal assessment or other <u>IBDP deadline</u>.
- **d) Identify and Address Learning Gaps:** The pandemic educational outcomes gap highlighted in this Brookings report from March 2022 depicts the reality that youth globally suffered. WIS cannot escape this reality but will not use it as an excuse. In this spirit, WIS educators are accommodating and including undertaking special measures to ensure comprehension of content and skills which may not have been developed and need reinforcement. Moreover, we are identifying gaps within student learning, especially core skills within reading, writing, and mathematics, and designing especially our future MYP Unit Plans to expressly meet these gaps.
- **e) Subject-specific Action Plans:** Teachers receive subject reports that give detailed feedback on each component of their subject. The DP teachers are presently reviewing these reports, and revising their syllabi and teaching strategies based upon this information. This year's review and target-setting process will be completed at the end of October.
- **f) Diploma Pathways:** Continue defining our WIS High School Diploma and conduct a feasibility study of the IB Career-related Diploma. We will do this in a way that is integrated with our college and careers counselling, ensuring a smooth best-fit WIS-to-University and future studies pipeline.

This is the second of three articles we are compiling which reviews recent WIS academic achievement results and their implications on how we prioritise our time and resources. In next week's Oryx we will review the IGCSE Results, and provide an update on the implementation of the MYP.

## **PRIMARY PRINCIPAL**

Dear WIS Community,

My absolute favourite part of how we share our learning at WIS are the Learning Celebrations. This week I visited EY3 celebrating their unit of inquiry on *People and Places in Our Community*. The excitement was palpable as I walked into the space where these learners were presenting their dioramas. There is something quite amazing about a 5-year-old confidently articulating what a community is (*a place where people work and play together*), what people do in their community, and why they are an important part of their community. As part of this unit, learners developed essential skills by interviewing people in their community, observing places around the campus (*we never knew Ms. Avril and Ms. Elsa also have an office! We love the workshop!*), procedures in the school (*Ms. Debbie, the door is broken- you need to lodge a ticket to get Mr. Antonio with his drill*), finding and labelling things, mapping, and theorising about their part in their community and how we are all connected (*well, if I wasn't here, the teachers wouldn't have a job*). Learners came away with an understanding of how things work in the small community of their classroom within the larger community of the school.

Learning Celebrations are more than a display of student work and a party at the end of a unit of inquiry. They allow learners to reflect on and articulate what they have learned, how they learned, questions they answered, research they conducted, and areas of strength and struggles.

Learning Celebrations are an opportunity for learners to receive feedback from the wider community (most importantly parents), and see that their learning is important and valued. These things are strongly emphasised within our PYP framework as we know they benefit and accelerate learning.

Created for an audience beyond the classroom, Learning Celebrations are powerful opportunities to make learning public. Preparing work to be shared with an authentic audience motivates learners and creates a purpose for them to care about the quality of their work. Presenting work to an authentic audience also raises the stakes and sets the expectation that all learners, not just a select group, will share their high-quality products. The experience learners have with their audience creates an emotional connection to the content and motivates them.

Homeroom teachers at WIS will communicate the dates of our Learning Celebrations with parents which take place at the end of every unit of inquiry. I encourage you to visit and enjoy these as much as you can.

#### SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

#### Excellence - how do we define excellence in a WIS context?

Our mission and vision is to "develop the full potential of each student in a stimulating environment of academic excellence, cultural diversity and active social responsibility to become internationally-minded independent thinkers."

#### How do we achieve this in a diverse 21st century school?

The generation growing up in the world right now is faced with distinctly different challenges than we were with regard to expectations, job market, environmental challenges as well as



matters of justice, equity and inclusion. What is our role as a community - the school together with our parents - to ensure that we educate our children to be able to manage these challenges to their own benefit, but also to the benefit of their communities, their environment and society at large?

This week, we had an assembly on different aspects in our school that we are currently paying attention to treating each other with respect, respecting our environment, appreciating each other and our differences and diversity and being able to create an environment in school that can cultivate academic as well as social excellence.

#### What does excellence mean to us at WIS?

We need to define excellence in our context and this needs to become a culture that is lived inside as well as outside of school - in school classrooms, on the playground, at home, in social interactions inside and outside of school and in everything we do. As I discussed with the Grade 11 students who worked on preparing the assembly and have discussed with different other people in the past week: excellence, respect, equity and responsible actions cannot be extrinsically forced if they are to be pillars of our community and in fact, pillars of society. Only if we can achieve intrinsic respect; excellence, because we believe in excellence; equity, because we believe in equity and behave responsibly, because we believe that this is the right thing to do, only then can our students, our community and society become these attributes.

Extrinsic rewards of "punishments" are only temporary solutions to challenges. In a world, where we are tempted to react to instant gratification, materialistic wealth and "beauty" through social media and advertisements, it is our responsibility as educators - at home as well as in school - to emphasise the good because of the good and not because of the reward or punishment.



In preparation for the assembly, the Grade 11 class spent two lessons exploring the different aspects that we want to focus on. HERE is the sheet that they created with statements that they believe need to be part of our definition of excellence. We have policies to guide all our school procedures, but if we - students, teachers, parents and the community - don't believe in these, the policies are but hollow skeletons that are there in a "shelf".



How do we educate our children - at home and in school - about RESPECT, EQUITY, responsible use of substances and many more topics that they are faced with on a daily basis?

- Why does bullying need to be addressed? in school as well as at home.
- Why do we need to talk about and deal with "substance abuse"?
- Why do we need to have a programme in school about a "comprehensive sexuality education"?
- Why do we need to consciously address matters of diversity, equity, equality?

Because we have a responsibility to guide our young people to

- know what is right to do.
- support their peers when they do the right thing
- stand up for themselves AND for others when things are not right.

As responsible members of the WIS community, we all need to believe and live the principles of excellence. This means that we respect each other and our diversity and differences as well as have the courage to speak up when things are not right.

We depend on the cooperation of families and the whole community to have conversations and discussions about these important matters at home, in their circle of friends as well as students amongst each other.

### **Health Hub**

Dear Families.

I'm attaching a link to a recent MUMPS outbreak notification from the Ministry of Health and Social Services for the Erongo region - the region includes Swakopmund, Henties Bay, Walvis Bay. Even though I've not received news of a mumps outbreak in Windhoek, our families travel to the coast on a regular basis.

The notification provides good information about the spread and symptoms of MUMPS, but I'd like to add the following Symptoms:

Because the salivary glands are affected and inflamed, someone with mumps will find it very difficult to tolerate any sour food or drink - it will cause pain and discomfort to the salivary glands. re Explanation of some of the symptoms:

- · Orchitis: Inflammation of one or both testicles
- Oophoritis: Inflammation of one or both ovaries
- Mastitis: Inflammation of breast tissue

Complications that develop due to severe untreated orchitis and oophoritis, can result in fertility impairment. Complications from meningitis or encephalitis can be fatal. Immunisation against mumps is available from your doctor or health clinic.
