# FROM THE DIRECTOR

### **Annual General Meeting**

Notification was sent out in early December but let me remind parents of the Annual General Meeting (AGM) to be held at school on Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> January at 6pm. I hope that all parents will make an effort to be there.

#### **Resilience and Parenting**

In 2016 Angela Duckworth published a book arguing that the key ingredient of success is what she called 'grit'. 'Grit', she suggested, is perseverance, determination, the ability to rise above failure, and the discipline to keep your eye on the long-term goal. Grit is unnecessary for short-term gratification but it is essential for long-term success. Her argument generated as much criticism as support but I don't know any teachers who would deny that 'grit' (or whatever you call it) is one of the most important things we are trying to encourage and develop in children.

Another word for 'grit' is perhaps resilience.

Adversity is a fact of life. Resilience is that ineffable quality that allows some people to be knocked down by life and come back at least as strong as before. Rather than letting difficulties or failure overcome them and drain their resolve, they find a way to rise from the ashes. Psychologists have identified some of the factors that make a person resilient, among them a positive attitude, optimism, the ability to regulate emotions, and the ability to see failure as a form of helpful feedback. Research shows that optimism helps blunt the impact of stress on the mind and body in the wake of disturbing experiences. And that gives people access to their own cognitive resources, enabling cool-headed analysis of what might have gone wrong and consideration of behavioural paths that might be more productive. Resilience is not some magical quality; it takes real mental work to transcend hardship. But even after misfortune, resilient people are able to change course and move toward achieving their goals. There's growing evidence that the elements of resilience can be cultivated.

By now you have heard quite a lot about ACE – the new accreditation protocol from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges.



We have had ACE training in March 2018 and an evaluation visit in November 2018. The next stage is that we must look long and hard at our practices through the lens of ACE and submit a report for their consideration by 29<sup>th</sup> November 2019. A team of four will then visit the school in January 2020 to confirm (we hope!) our reaccreditation.

As part of this detailed process, we must now complete an online survey that will help NEASC and ultimately us to better understand what we are doing well and what we need to improve. There are different versions of the survey for teachers, leadership, students and **parents**.

The surveys are anonymous and we will only see the aggregated results. But they will be a very valuable tool that will help us to focus our efforts on improving the educational experience we offer **your children**.

# **PYP Coordinator's message**

Welcome back to a new exciting term ahead of us. Happy New Year to you and your families.



This year is an exciting time in the Primary Years Programme. The IB PYP framework has undergone a lot of reflection and review to improve the framework. The IB PYP is launching the new enhanced PYP. The Primary teachers are excited and looking forward to these enhancements and incorporating them in our school.

The launch of the New Enhanced PYP will be phased in over the period of 2019-2020. The launch will include the new organising structure of the learner, learning and teaching and the learning community. This year our school will be undergoing a deep dive into what this means and how we can incorporate this in our school.

#### A SUMMARY OF KEY ENHANCEMENTS:

- The PYP will be viewed through the new organising structure of the learner, learning and teaching and the learning community.
- THE LEARNER: We all have AGENCY, the capacity to act intentionally. Recognising and supporting agency in the enhanced PYP will create a culture of mutual respect, acknowledging the rights and responsibilities of students, schools and the wider learning community, enabling students to take ownership of their learning and teachers of their teaching.
- The EARLY LEARNER: Will be redefined to include young students from 3-6 years, with enhancements offering future flexibility to inquire into a minimum of four units each year.



- Increased support for the early learner will highlight the importance of planning uninterrupted time for play, building strong relationships, creating and maintaining responsive learning spaces and engaging in symbolic exploration and expression.
- LEARNER PROFILE: Attributes will be reinforced, and brought to life throughout the learning community, allowing greater flexibility to incorporate learning dispositions relevant to your own school context.
- ACTION: Will still draw on inspiration and innovation in the PYP. We will be encouraging the learners to explore different demonstrations of action as participation, advocacy, social justice, entrepreneurship and lifestyle choices. The EXHIBITION will be repositioned as a powerful demonstration of student agency.

Our school looks forward to this new discovery into the PYP. Here at WIS we always strive to make things better.

We wish everyone a happy 2019 and especially our students a good second semester of the 2018/2019 academic year.

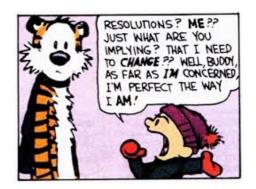

# 'FADENGRAFIK'

#### A blast from the past - art exhibition

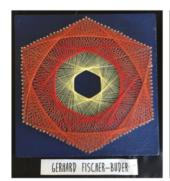
On the last day of Semester 1, the grade 6 classes had a short, but well-received exhibition of their 'Fadengrafik' pieces in the foyer of the auditorium.

'Fadengrafik' (String Art) was highly popular in the 1970's and is an excellent technique to not only extend the learners' span of attention, but also improves psychomotor skills (and therefore handwriting) in a playful way and with a beautiful outcome. It further trains the recognition of patterns and can be integrated well with learning mathematics.

Points are connected in straight lines with strings and through rhythmic repetition a diversity of curves and patterns are formed. The points can lie in straight lines like the sides of squares or triangles, but they can also be placed on curved edges of any circular or oval shape and many combinations thereof.

'Fadengrafik' requires precise working habits and gives direct feedback to the learner when focus is lost, because mistakes are instantly visible through irregularities in the pattern created.

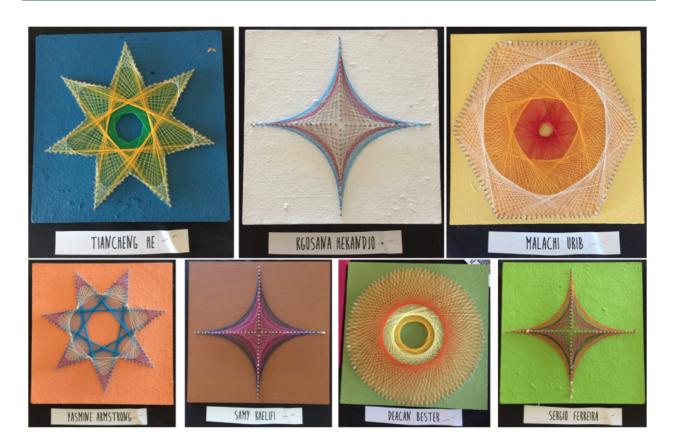

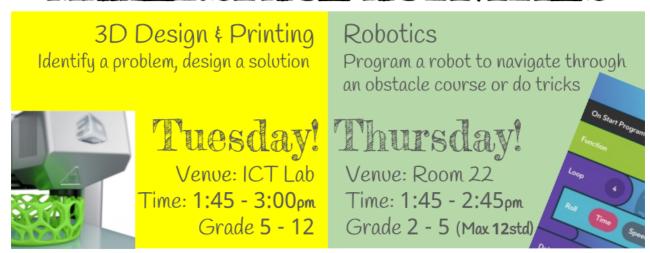




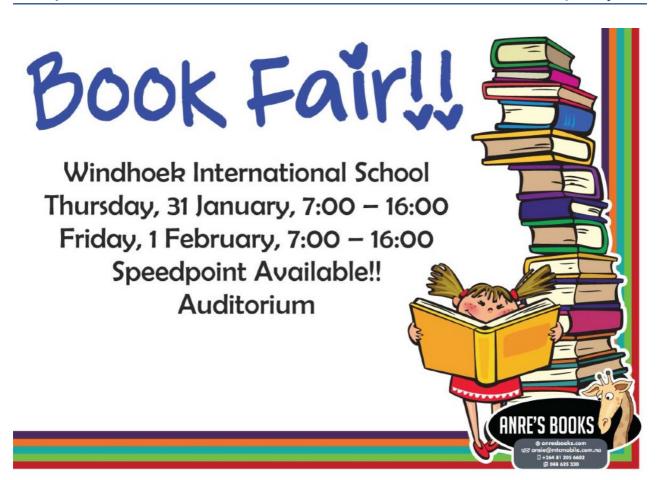
