Security Update

As noted in previous communication, on Tuesday morning there was a security breach and theft on campus. The safety and security of our staff and students is the highest priority for our school, and on Thursday we had a very productive meeting between school administration, the local community watch, representatives of the US Embassy, Tephcor, and parents. We identified some immediate and very positive actions that include clearing brush from the perimeter of the school, training and modifying security guard procedures, advocating for increased police presence in the area, increasing the use of spotlights and CCTV, improving the timeliness and regularity of Tephcor-police-neighborhorhood watch communication, and closer monitoring of the school fence. In the medium term, a new and improved perimeter fence system will be purchased and installed. Thank you for your continued support and compliance with pedestrian and vehicular entrance protocols. I know that the security guards appreciate your support and understanding in this area as well.

Community of Learners

The PYP values teachers' learning and capacity building. Teachers who model themselves as learners and feel empowered and responsible for their own learning have an impact on student learning. With this in mind, as one of our goals in the Primary this year is to articulate our language and literacy programme using the



ACARA standards, teachers this week engaged in the second offering of a series of workshops about language and literacy development. The aims of these workshops are to:

- Create a whole-school approach to the teaching of literacy and a common language to talk about student progress in the literacy areas
- Empower teachers to impact student learning
- Enhance communication with parents, Learning Support and EAL specialists.
- Identify student needs with regards to literacy
- Understand what it is we need to teach and assess

At the start of the new year, I'd like to honour a person I greatly admire, a person who has been so genuine and so completely human; a person, who is an inspiration and has shared some wise words at the <u>Young World Summit 2010</u> with youth leaders around the world.

"Dream dreams ... go on being idealistic, just go on dreaming that we are going to have a different kind of world than the one that we are leaving you. When we come back and we look at what you have done: what would we see? A world, hey, there's no longer any poverty, there's no longer any hunger, there's no longer any war. Hey, you are going to make this a beautiful, beautiful world. ... But you, I want to ask you to do me just one little favour ... I think you're fantastic, and I want to clap (for) you, but if I clap you all by myself, people are going to say aahhh, we always thought ... no. So please join me in clapping some of the most fantastic human beings in the world - come on, join me, thank you, thank you ..." Tutu addresses the Young World Summit 2010

Vaccinations for teens against Covid-19

The Namibian Ministry of Health & Social Services has approved and advised vaccinating our 12 year olds and older against COVID-19. Windhoek Central Hospital administers vaccinations, as do the following two central sites:

1. OSH-Med International Walk -In at Maerua Mall opposite Food Lovers.

Opening times: Tuesday to Friday: 10:00 - 18:00 Sat & Sun: 10:00 - 14:00

2. NG Church Eros: (Next to/opp Eros Post Office on Nelson Mandela)

 Opening times:
 Mon to Fri:
 9:00 - 15:30

 Sat:
 8:00 - 14:30

 Sun:
 Closed

Some additional information:

The vaccinations are free

- Only the **Pfizer** option is available for teens (12 17 years old)
- Two shots are given, 21 days apart
- No booster for teens at this stage
- Parental consent is required. Parents are asked to accompany their children

Common side effects:

- Pain and redness at the injection site
- Chills
- Fever
- Headache
- Fatigue
- Nausea
- Muscle pain

These side effects take some hours to develop and should go away in a day or two.

A cold compress to the painful arm, plenty of fluids and rest will help relieve symptoms. Information about taking OTC pain relief is conflicting. I would recommend speaking to your doctor or pharmacist about giving your child e.g. ibuprofen or paracetamol for pain relief.

The CDC lists, amongst others, the following advantages for getting your child vaccinated:

- Helps to protect family members, including siblings who are not yet eligible for vaccination and vulnerable family members who have chronic illnesses or are elderly
- Significantly reduces the risk of a child developing Multi-system Inflammatory Syndrome (MIS-C) or requiring hospitalisation, or developing long-term complications from COVID-19

An excerpt from the statement made on the 13th January 2022 by Dr Kalumbi Shangala, Minister of Health & Social Services :

"We have noted with utter disgust, the persistent and sustained anti-vaccination campaigns laced with false narratives that people who are dying from Covid-19 are those who are vaccinated. Whereas the anti-vaccination proponents decampaign vaccination, they have no viable alternative to offer in relation to vaccination. An analysis of the Covid-19 statistics from the 1st -11th January shows that:

- 81% of new infections is among the unvaccinated individuals;
- 97% of admissions to hospitals is of the unvaccinated individuals;
- 94% of ICU admissions is of the unvaccinated individuals; and
- 91% of deaths is of the unvaccinated individuals.

Statistics do not lie. Numbers do not lie. The benefits of vaccination are convincingly demonstrated even in Namibia. It is unethical and morally repugnant to deny a scientifically proven benefit to an individual without offering a viable alternative to the proven benefits."
