Rumours...

A number of parents have expressed concern about the advertisement we placed in The Namibian this week inviting applications for teaching positions at the school. My own job was (is) among them.

It's really not much of a story.

We employ 90+ people. About 70 are Namibians. The rest are international (well, we are an *international* school). Those of us who are guests in the country are awarded work permits, generally for two years. So, every two years we must apply for a new work permit. Understandably, the government of Namibia wishes to promote employment among Namibians. So every year we advertise to see if there are Namibians who could fill the positions of those whose contracts and work permits are expiring.

Our school year runs from 1st August to 31st July (and our employment contracts do too) so now is the time (every year) when we place this ad in the paper.

For the record, at the time of writing, just five of the school's current employees will be moving on at the end of the school year in July. Call it about 5.5%. This is the seventh school I've worked in and turnover here is actually very low.

As for my own position, I am simply one of those whose contract and work permit will expire during the course of the year. Time will tell but I'm very happy here and I hope I will be able to stay.

It may also be necessary to reassure people that this routine (indeed, annual) advertisement in The Namibian has nothing whatsoever to do with last year's theft.

And on that matter I can confirm that the suspect was arrested last month and will, I believe, next appear before a judge on 28th February.

PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Beginning Monday, February 25th and continuing through Friday, March 8th we will be administering the MAP Growth (*Measures of Academic Progress*) tests. Grades 1-2 will take two tests: Language and Mathematics while Grades 3-5 will take three tests: Language, Reading and Mathematics. The tests will be taken on the school iPads.

The purpose of these tests is to determine your child's instructional level and measure the growth in student learning over time. The results will provide teachers with information about what students are ready to learn now, which will be useful for teaching and learning for the remaining academic year.


WEEKLY PUZZLER

SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

Communicating with each other

One of the most important aspects of inter-personal relationships is transparent and open communication. A school is a place where people interact and where communication is essential for the effective functioning of the institution. **Communication Skills** are one of the 5 ATL skills we address in our daily teaching and learning processes. And, as I mention frequently, without clear and open communication across the different stakeholders in school, an efficient working and learning environment cannot be possible.

Communication happens on many different levels. In every lesson, from school to parents, from parents to school, from teachers to students, from teachers to parents, from parents to teachers, from school to parents and many more. If we communicate efficiently with each other, everybody benefits and knows what is happening. If we don't, there will be misunderstandings and frustrations.

WIS has different mechanisms to communicate with students and parents. As a whole school, we use iSAMS to correspond with parents and to store all necessary information with regard to our students and families - contact details, enrollment, emails sent home and much more. It is essential that parents make sure that their contact details are up to date at all times.

WIS also uses the D6 Communicator (https://d6.co.za/education/en/downloads/) for more general communication with the community. The D6 has policies, important documentation, the academic calendar, contact details of staff and much more. Important reminders from the school to parents/the community are red flagged on the D6. It is expected that parents have this application on their computers to keep up to date with happenings in the school.

In Secondary School, we use Edmodo (https://www.edmodo.com/mobile) and Managebac (https://www.managebac.com/) as Learning Management platforms for our teaching and learning. Parents are expected to create profiles on these platforms to be informed about their child(ren)'s educational progress at all times. Edmodo has many excellent features to enable transparent communication between school and homethere is a chat function that facilitates monitored discussions between students and teachers, homework and assignment deadlines are posted on Edmodo, parents can follow their child's progress on Edmodo by seeing the grades posted. Edmodo is used in the Secondary School for all students from Grade 6 - 10.



In the IB Diploma Programme WIS uses Managebac as the Learning Management Platform. On Managebac, deadlines are posted, assessments are uploaded to the IB via Managebac and students manage their CAS progress on Managebac. Students (and parents) receive messages via Managebac as well. We will be hosting an information evening for parents in Secondary School on the use of Edmodo and Managebac straight after the March break to guide parents through the different features and also to address possible queries from parents.



Sometimes we are criticised for using too many different tools for communication. However, each tool has its own features and purpose and should be used accordingly. If

you have any suggestions on how we can do an even better job communicating, your suggestions are always welcome (mreiff@wis.edu.na).

CANA Zone 4 Swimming



MODELLING IN IBDP CHEMISTRY



Grade 11 students investigating the different angles and shapes of chemical compounds by using the MOLYMOD molecular models.
