Spekboom

Help fight climate change!

In Grade 4A we planted two Spekboom plants in front of our class. Spekboom is very special. Why is it so special, it's just another plant? No, a Spekboom helps fight air pollution! It takes carbon dioxide from the air and changes it into plant matter. One hectare of Spekboom can absorb between 4 and 10 tonnes of carbon per year. A Spekboom is also called a 'pork bush'. Its Scientific name is Portulacaria afra.

Spekbooms are spread throughout SADC countries such as Namibia, Zimbabwe, South Africa, and Zambia.

It is edible with very high nutritional values. It is a favoured food of black rhinos, elephants, and kudus. We can also eat it, it has a slight lemony taste. The leaves are juicy and full of moisture. A Spekboom can live up to two hundred years old.

If you want to see a Spekboom in real life and smell some fresh air you can walk pass our class, and if you want to help fight climate change: **PLANT A SPEKBOOM!**

Accreditation Visit - ACE Learning - NEASC

From Sunday, 19 January 2020 until Friday, 24 January 2020, a team of four visitors will be at WIS conducting the External Review Visit that is the final part of our accreditation process for this cycle.

We have had a visit from NEASC in November of 2018. After the visit, WIS received a Report with commendations and recommendations on Teaching and Learning. We then had six months to reflect on our practices and in November 2019, we submitted an Internal Reflection Report. The external visit will conclude the process and will result in an External Review Report that we will get after the visit in January.

The process was consultative and all stakeholders were involved at some stage in the process. We now ask that all stakeholders are also actively involved in the last phase of this process and participate in the activities of the External Visit as much as possible. Here is the schedule for the visit.

The visitors will be meeting with the Board, with students, teachers and parents in the week to get a good impression of Teaching and Learning at WIS.

Of particular importance is the conversation scheduled with parents on:

- Monday 20th January from 07:30 08:15
- The meeting will be at the PTA Community Centre

and all parents are welcome to attend this conversation. It is an informal conversation where the visitors try to gauge the parents' experiences with regard to their child(ren)'s Teaching and Learning experiences at WIS.

ACE Learning Eco-System

Architecture of Learning (A) defines what learners learn, why they learn it, how they learn it, how learning is assessed and communicated, to what extent learners are able to choose their own learning, and how the learning community knows that it has achieved the desired impact on the learner. In an environment characterised by a shared understanding and language of learning, learners demonstrate qualities of mind and heart that allow them to become responsible and successful citizens. An effective learning community fosters creative and critical thinking, performance, action, and entrepreneurship. In such a community learning and creating, thinking, doing, and 'making' are valued equally.



(Learning Principles Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4 focus on a community's Learning Architecture)

Culture of Learning (C) defines the learning community's beliefs about the conditions that underpin effective learning, the norms and core values to which it adheres, and the impact leadership, governance, and staff have on the learning community's sustainability and evolution. Learning culture represents the statutory as well as unspoken agreements woven into a fabric that creates community, sustains purpose and defines direction. Transformational learning communities have designed mechanisms that support intentional and systemic reflection, research, and future-oriented thinking.

(Learning Principles Nos. 5, 6, 7, and 8 focus on a community's Learning Culture)

Ecology of Learning (E) defines the physical and social/emotional 'space' in which learning occurs. It encompasses the nature of relationships, interactions, and communication within the learning community that sustain its values and norms. An effective learning ecology supports and is aligned with the architecture and culture of learning. Its principles are indispensable to the achievement of the purpose for which the learning community exists. Such communities also recognize that effective learning is not necessarily a function of fixed spaces, times, or forms.

(Learning Principles Nos. 9 and 10 focus on a community's Learning Ecology)

Thank you, Lola, for sharing the inspirational story of your life after WIS over the last half-year.


