Dear WIS Community,

The FIFA World Cup this week coincided with an email I received from some Grade 4 students. They wanted to do something about the situation on the football field during break time. 'Everyone likes to play football', they said,' but some people are making that hard'. What can we do about it? I like it when students act and take it into their hands to solve a problem. It relates to student agency, something that is central to our PYP framework. It prompted Ms. Seodhna and I to help the Grade 4 and 5 football players think of positive ways we can behave on the football pitch, when emotions about winning or losing can run high. We all need to be able to enjoy the game, what can we do about that ourselves?



"One way of thinking of learner agency is when learners have the 'power to act'. When learners move from being passive recipients to being much more active in the learning process, and actively involved in the decisions about the learning, then they have greater agency."

We gathered in the staff room to list the things we didn't like were happening on the football field. It appeared everyone was experiencing the same thing! Many students admitted to being part of the problem sometimes and were keen to make a change.

'I don't want to mention names here, but sometimes people use unfriendly language.'


'I don't like it when no one passes to me, or criticises me for missing a goal.'

'Sometimes people use physical responses when losing.'


'I need to learn to control my emotions.'


Peace Pals International



Motivation: How? - So What?



What makes you get up in the morning? Is it something that makes you feel good or do you get up "because you have to"?

Motivation is a driving force of our actions, interactions and everyday life. It can be both extrinsic and intrinsic. What is the impact of either of those?

According to <u>PositivePsychology.com</u> "Motivation has as many faces as there are human desires. The simplest definition of motivation boils down to

wanting (Baumeister, 2016). We want a change in behavior, thoughts, feelings, self-concept, environment, and relationships.

People often say that motivation doesn't last. Well, neither does bathing – that's why we recommend it daily. (Zig Ziglar)

At the beginning of the year, Kevin Bartlett worked with teachers and the board to create some Principles that can guide our community at WIS. Back then, we came up with the basic skeleton of these, but they have now been worked on and will be shared for input from students, teachers and parents in the coming months.

Kevin is the founder of the CGC (<u>Common Ground Collaborative</u>). One of the their Guiding Principles is "From Extrinsic Control to Intrinsic Self-regulation:


We don't believe you can control people into quality. We work with students, teachers, parents, leaders, boards and schools to provide them with the time, teamwork, training and tools to self-regulate towards outstanding learning."

The belief that we cannot control people into quality is a fundamental aspect of intrinsic motivation. If we are motivated only by extrinsic factors, motivation is never sustainable and will not be meaningful. We have to be able to find ways of intrinsic motivation where the driver of our motivation is our internal will to succeed, be happy and have a fulfilled life.

This is something we are constantly working on here at WIS in our approach to education - creating lifelong learners who learn, because they see the value in it and they are driven by the belief that this is for their own success and fulfillment in life.

Speaking to our students: As a young person, how do you move from being "controlled" to do something by outside forces (your parents, your teachers, your school), to doing something because you believe that it will bring meaning to your life? If you find an answer to this question, you are well on your way to success and happiness in your life.





The method of collection is just to activate the odometer on your phone or, if you have one, a specific recording device on a smartwatch.


Legacy Of Love and MTB 3 Minute Interview

Celebration of Hard Work - Grade 12s - Midday on November 15

All 22 DP Class of 2023 students and many DP teachers met for a wonderful social on a recent weekday at midday to celebrate the completion of their 4,000 word independent research project (the Extended Essay) and other academic coursework.

Inquiry and Collaboration in DP History Grade 11

- To what extent did Hendrik Witbooi contribute to achieving independence and aid in reaching liberation for Namibia between 1966 1990?


