Finally, a friendly reminder that this year's Annual General Meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, 26th January 2022. The reports and financials were shared this week by email.



PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Dear WIS Community,

This week in the Primary, WIS News was launched by Grade 2B. This (revived) initiative will be led by a different class every two weeks and will report on the latest news in the Primary School. Mr. Danai and Mr. JP have set up the Green Screen and students will get the opportunity to step into the role of news presenters, interviewers, journalists and editors. In this week's Oryx I would like to explain why I am delighted to see this happen and why from an educational perspective, initiatives like these are excellent and an important part of literacy development. I am going to take some excerpts from my own work in a chapter I wrote entitled Rethinking Literacy published in the book Teaching and Learning in International Schools: Lessons from Primary Practice.



"If it were possible to define generally the mission of education, it could be said that its fundamental purpose is to ensure that all students benefit from learning in ways that allow them to participate fully in public, community, [Creative] and economic life." (New London Group, 2000, in Jenkins 2006)



Once we evaluated the risks and rewards of starting a cafe, we had to come up with the name, the concept, the recipes, find staff, register the business, design and renovate a property, manage our finances and most difficult of all, learn to deal with uncertainty.

We had to figure out how to manage our new business relationship in parallel with our personal relationship, dividing responsibility and communicating more effectively.

Our first child together, Chai of the Tiger was brought to life with a gestation period of only 3 months. Many people have been surprised by this speed, existing business owners, aspiring ones, friends and family.

AGAIN: Some thought we were crazy, some were inspired, and some have marvelled in what we have done, unable to believe they were capable of something similar themselves.

However, we are lucky to say that no-one actually discouraged us, and that we have each-other's support in it all.

We are by no means saying we know what we are doing, nor that it was easy, but we are learning a whole lot, and even more rapidly than when things seemed more "certain".

We may or may not still emigrate, but we are figuring out our values. Tim Ferris used the following quote in the "4-hour work week" (one of our mini-retirement reads).

"Make mistakes of ambition and not mistakes of sloth. Develop the strength to do bold things, not the strength to suffer." — Niccolo Machiavelli, The Prince

In today's world, most students have almost unlimited access to mobile devices. More than ever before, students are creating their own media, something not witnessed in past generations. A quick Youtube search will show an abundance of content created by young people. Educators need to teach not only the traditional literacy skills students need to succeed but also the critical thinking skills that allow students to not only consume but create digital content. If, as educators, we fail to incorporate the importance of

media literacy, we are consigning our students to a future in which they only know how to respond to stimulus created by those who know how to tell our technology

what to do (Pannell, 2019). An approach to teaching literacy that includes critical thinking skills to decipher media but also the creation of all kinds of media, particularly the kinds of media that students engage with on a daily basis, is of paramount importance to develop 21st century global digital citizens.

The great news is that technology, such as Green Screen, iMovie and a range of other webtools offer educators a wealth of opportunities to teach not only new literacy skills, but other valuable skills, too. They allow children to, as the quotation above mentions, to participate fully in public, community, and economic life.

As an example, students may publish their work to the web allowing not only their peers but a global audience to give feedback on their work.

Through the creation and publishing of digital media students and educators share, teach and learn from each other. They learn engagement, accountability and motivation while contributing to community experience that expands their knowledge of communication in our global society.

I can't wait to see how all of this evolves through WIS News!



Assessment and Grading - what's the difference?

It's not about a pass or fail! It's about learning!

Most of us have grown up with "grades", tests, exams - pressure from these to perform and compare ourselves. At WIS and with current developments in education, the focus of progress shifts to a student's growth - to learning that is more than rote memorisation. Learning has to include the acquisition of skills that a young person can use later in their education and career and in life.



Assessment and grading are often used as synonyms. They are, however, very different from each other. Grading revolves around performance - numbers, letters - quantitative data. Assessment, on the other hand, provides learners with feedback so that gaps in learning can be identified and addressed - in that way real learning and growth will occur.

To outline the differences between assessment and grading, it is prudent to determine what the goal is of grading and what the goal of assessment is.

The goal of grading is to evaluate individual student performance against a set of criteria for a given unit or course. Grades may or may not be an accurate measure of student learning, depending on what is being evaluated. For example, attendance, on-time assignment submission, formatting, and participation may not

reveal a lot about how much a student has learned, but they can offer indicators or signals for instructor intervention. (Turnitin Newsletter/January 2022 - <u>blog entry</u>)

Grades alone do not provide feedback that results in learning. They provide a standardised measurement of what was tested. Thomas Guskey argues that, when grades are used alone, "even accurate, task-involving grades don't lead to improved student learning. Students get no direction for improvement from a letter, number, word, phrase, or symbol attached to evidence of their learning. Only when grades are paired with individualised comments that offer guidance and direction for improvement do they enhance achievement and foster learning progress" (Guskey, 2019).

Assessment on the other hand, is more than just a number, a letter or a phrase. Assessment gives room for feedback on a deeper level which in turn leads to learning on a more real and deeper level. Assessment can guide students to the next step in their learning, it can help a student reflect on their learning and take responsibility for their learning. Formative assessments are low stakes tasks that are assessed along the way to guide and feed back to the learner. This can then direct learning towards the summative assessment that occurs at the end of a teaching period.

At WIS, assessments are intended to put our Definition of Learning into practice: Learning at WIS is a journey of inquiring, discovering, and experimenting while developing understanding and acquiring new knowledge, skills and concepts. In the process the learner constructs meaning by making connections and applying these in daily life situations. The learner realises individual potential through continued reflection and exploration. The learning environment is multi-sensory, collaborative, enjoyable and encourages international-mindedness.

When learning happens in this context, it can be meaningful and long lasting and support a young person's journey across disciplines and in multiple ways.

As adults, we need to be weary of "pushing for good grades". Although universities still admit students according to their numeric performance, there is a clear shift towards a more holistic approach to learning also at tertiary institutions. Students who have had the opportunity to follow the International Baccalaureate curriculum, will have had the chance to develop more holistically - to be able to think critically, learn independently and be actively involved in their learning journey.
