FROM THE DIRECTOR

RECRUITMENT

The vast majority of international schools operate on an August to July school year. The northern summer is therefore when the game of musical chairs is played and many teachers leave one school and move to another. Teachers like to have their new jobs lined up and schools like to have replacements appointed as early as possible so now – January and February – is the peak season for recruitment for August.

In fact, turnover at WIS is relatively low and this year is typical. At present we have four vacancies for August (or sooner) and we are actively seeking suitably qualified staff.

What does "suitably qualified" mean? Well, for starters, it means having a recognised teaching qualification. Secondly, previous experience of teaching one or more of our educational programmes (the PYP, Checkpoint, IGCSEs and the IBDP) is an obvious advantage. And thirdly, I really want to find people with substantial experience of living and working internationally.

But...

It's hard. The number of international schools is growing faster than ever and competition to attract and retain the best teachers is fierce.

We do have a lot going for us. The school has a good name internationally and Namibia is an attractive destination. Many good teachers would certainly consider us seriously when looking for the next job.

Junelle Stroh: Primary Drama

My earliest memory of 'what I would like to be when I grow up?' was at the age of five and it was to be a teacher. This dream however, was short lived after I shared it with my Year 1 teacher.

It is a handicap the school is going to have to address.

PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Have you subscribed to your child's class blog yet? Do you read the posts? Have you posted a comment in response to what you've read? Writing for a public audience is a continuous learning process for everyone. This week the homeroom teachers reviewed their blogs, with a focus on what is included on the blog and how the blog could be improved; while the specialist teachers discussed how they can be involved in blogging. One of the concerns that arose during the discussion is that many parents don't seem to be participating with the blog: either parents haven't yet subscribed to the blog, they aren't reading the blog, or that parents aren't posting a comment.

Why is participating in the class blog important? First, it's a means of communication between school and home, providing a window into what your child is learning and how your child is spending his/her day at school and most importantly to celebrate student learning. The information on the blog is current. Links to websites are included, as well as other information for how you can support your child at home. The older students are participating in their class blog, posting comments, homework and writing articles. This is helping them with their writing skills and being aware of internet safety and protocols.

When parents post a comment on the blog it shows the students that you are interested in what is happening in the classroom. If the truth be known, I read the blogs but haven't until yesterday posted a comment. During the


SECONDARY PRINCIPAL

We often talk about knowing what our children do in their private time and how important it is that parents do know what their kids are up to when they are having their own down time.

Lots of our children spend many hours a day on an electronic device, on their iPad, laptop, and phone. They chat on social media platforms and participate in discussions about their lives and experiences.

At school, we encourage the responsible use of technology for learning. During lessons, iPads are often used for research, exercises, and different activities. We do have a policy in school however, that children are not allowed to have their phones switched on during the school day from 7:20 to 13:30.

However, we find it time and again, that students call their parents with their phones during the day, that parents call their children during the school day and that some students



find it hard to avoid playing games on their devices while they are expected to use the device for lesson activities.

We find ourselves in a watershed moment with regards to technology. On the one hand we blame it for taking our kids away from playing and reading, on the other hand, it makes our lives so much easier communication, information, staying in touch.

In school, we have the same challenges. It is hard for a teacher in a class of 25 to always see everything every student is doing.

What is the conclusion?

We have to try to educate our children to use technology responsibly. This is a big challenge for us as parents in the first place, because our kids spend a lot of time at home on their devices, often unsupervised. The role the school plays in this process is probably more a role to direct the children's tech-expertise - let them use what they know in a manner that assists their learning in some way.


