On 1st February, the newly constituted Board will appoint up to four additional members and will elect from their ranks this term's Board Chair, Vice Chair, and Treasurer.



PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Dear WIS Community,

Last week I wrote about our Learning Principles and how these are further articulated in a set of high-impact research-based teaching practices that we have agreed should be visible in our classrooms. One of these practices is making clear to students what the learning intentions are and what success looks like. Learning intentions make students aware of what they are learning. They provide a road map for the learning process. Providing students with these at the beginning of a unit or topic, and then constantly referring to them throughout, means that students and teachers can evaluate and track progress.

Over the past year as a school we have identified the need to make a clear link between learning intentions (what we want children to know and do) and learning engagements (how students will apply and practice knowledge and skills). Nowhere is this clearer than when you enter the EY3 classroom! This morning, for our Early Years parent workshop, parents were invited to explore lots of hands-on learning engagements and shown how these related directly to achieving learning goals. As Principal this shows me there has been intentional planning, thought about learning and assessment of student progress. It is also wonderful to see the effort that the team put into making this transparent to parents!




Another high-impact strategy I came across this week was:

Worked Examples

- \square Use of modelled examples that are worked through with the students
- Showing steps that are required to complete a task or solve a problem
- Co-constructing texts with students
- Collectively analysing a model
- Co-constructing success criteria

Grade 2 students were learning how to write instructions (or procedural text) as part of a science unit. The teachers showed them many examples of procedural writing which they then analysed and took apart as a class. After making popcorn, the teachers and students wrote the instructions together. They also created success criteria. Learners were then equipped to write their own procedural text.



I hope this has given you a glimpse into #LearningAtWIS!

I have been back in Namibia since 2018, after four years of university in upstate New York and one year working in Chicago.




