GDPR

On 25th May 2018 (i.e. tomorrow) an important new piece of legislation will become law in all twenty-eight countries of the European Union. This is the General Data **Protection Regulation (GDPR).**

It applies to all EU citizens and it applies to all organisations that hold data on EU citizens wherever they are in the world.

It therefore applies to WIS.

If you are not an EU citizen, you can ignore it. But if you are an EU citizen or your partner is or your child is, you need to be aware of GDPR.

You should today have received a letter from the school explaining GDPR in more detail. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to ask.

PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

At this time of the school year, I always find myself questioning where the year has gone and thinking there is so much to be done in the time that remains. While the end of the school year seems to still be in the distant future, it's just four weeks away.

Some of the Primary students will be leaving WIS and going to new schools either in Windhoek or in another country. It's important that those who are leaving have closure to their time at WIS and also that those who are returning to WIS have closure with their friends who are leaving. At school we support the students with this transition by making goodbye cards, setting time aside on the child's last day for doing something special, acknowledging the leaving children at assembly, and meeting with Ms Sharon to talk about what they look forward to as well as what they are going to miss. When we know in advance of the actual date of a child's last day of school, we can plan accordingly.

Some suggestions for how you can prepare your child for transitioning to a new school include:

- Acknowledge your child's emotions about moving to a new school or another country.
- Talk about what your child looks forward to in the new school, what will be missed about WIS, and any worries he/she may have.
- Schedule playdates with close friends they might create a scrapbook or video about their friendship and include photos and a list or description of favorite activities they've done together.
- Get contact details (email addresses, phone numbers) for your child's friends and share your contact details so that they can keep in touch.



Similar suggestions can be applied to helping your child whose friend is moving to a new school or to another country:

- Acknowledge your child's emotions about his/her friend's moving,
- Talk about what your child has enjoyed about their friendship and what will be missed; include a discussion about the friends he/she will continue to have at WIS and who might become a new friend;
- Schedule a playdate with the friend who is leaving they might create a scrapbook or video about their friendship and include photos and and a list or description of favorite activities they've done together;
- Get contact details (email addresses, phone numbers) of the friend who is leaving and share your contact details so that the children can keep in touch.

If you know that your child will be leaving WIS in the next month, please inform your child's teacher, Ms Carol (cheimstadt@wis.edu.na), and Ms Catherine (reception@wis.edu.na) so we can ensure that your child has the chance to have closure for his/her time at WIS and give your child a proper farewell.

A thanks goes out to the Knitting Club - who have donated the scarves they have knitted to this charity.



On Monday, 21st May 2018, Mr. Francois Theart, from Snakes of Namibia, conducted a snake awareness programme for Primary students from Years 2 to 6. It was an informative session with live and venomous snakes for all to see. Mr. Francois shared information about what to do when one is confronted with snakes, why snakes are important and how snakes are afraid of humans as much as humans are afraid of them. The snakes we learnt about (and saw) were:



Black Mamba



Spitting cobra (Zebra snake)



Puff Adder



Cape Cobra



Boomslang



Python



Angolan Cobra

Some advices that Mr. Francois gave all of us were::

When in the proximity of snakes:

- Most snake bites happen to people who want to kill them.
- Leave the snake alone, don't bother it.
- Don't try to provoke it.
- Don't try to run away.
- Stand absolutely still when you see a snake, snakes usually see humans as objects.
- Don't try to capture it.
- Contact a snake catcher or the Ministry of Environment.
