PRIMARY PRINCIPAL

Dear WIS Community,

I am really delighted with <u>the WIS Principles</u> recently approved by the WIS board, which articulate our values: what we do, how we do it and why. These make me proud to be part of WIS. The People Principle states that 'We are proud of our diversity of culture, language, race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, belief, tradition, ancestry, and socio-economic status. We want our learners to cultivate a strong sense of self. We recognise that each person holds multiple identities and has a unique personal story to tell.'



I am therefore equally delighted with our Learning Enrichment Team, who have put the WIS People Principle into practice by organising a string of events for Neurodiversity Celebration Week.

What is neurodiversity?

Neurodiversity is a term used to describe the natural variations in brain function and cognition among human beings. Neurodiversity encompasses a wide range of conditions that affect the brain and nervous system, including autism, dyslexia, ADHD, Tourette syndrome, and many others. These conditions are not abnormalities or diseases, but rather represent different ways of processing information and experiencing the world. People who are neurodivergent have unique strengths and challenges that can enhance or hinder their ability to learn and interact with others.

Neurodiversity Celebration Week is a worldwide initiative that challenges stereotypes and misconceptions about neurological differences. It aims to transform how neurodivergent individuals are perceived and supported by providing schools with the opportunity to recognise the many talents and advantages of being neurodivergent, while creating more inclusive and equitable cultures that celebrate differences and empower every individual (https://www.neurodiversityweek.com/).

At WIS, we strive to create an inclusive and supportive environment for all students, regardless of their neurodivergent status. We believe that every student has the potential to succeed and thrive, and we are committed to providing the

resources and accommodations necessary to make this a reality. Here are some other ways in which we support neurodiversity at WIS:

Professional Learning

At the start of the year, we held a staff information session about neurodiversity and strategies for supporting neurodiverse children in the classroom. WIS has a Neurodiversity Professional Learning Community that meets to discuss research and teaching practices and advises teachers on ways to support neurodiverse children.

Systems

Our action-based Child Study meetings held once a week explore individual strategies for specific children. Our Learning Enrichment Department is available to support both teachers and students in identifying and addressing any needs that may arise.

Curriculum, teaching and learning

One of the most important aspects of embracing neurodiversity is helping children learn about their brains. By understanding how their brains work, children can better understand their strengths and challenges and develop strategies to overcome any obstacles. This knowledge can also help children develop a sense of selfawareness and self-advocacy, which can be invaluable skills as they progress through their academic and personal lives.

Real life experiences for students to explore their skills and competencies

This past week, we have had a few events that our students participated in where they were able to experience real life situations.



The Commonwealth is a voluntary association of 56 independent and equal countries. It is home to 2.5 billion people, and includes both advanced economies and developing countries. 32 of our members are small states including many island nations. Our member governments have agreed to shared goals like development, democracy and peace. Our values and principles are expressed in the Commonwealth Charter. The Commonwealth's roots go back to the British Empire. But today, any country can join the Commonwealth. The last two countries to join the Commonwealth were Gabon and Togo in 2022. On Monday, the 13th we were invited to the Commonwealth Day Celebrations in Parliament under the theme:

'Forging a sustainable and peaceful common future', which combines the active commitment of member states to support the promotion of peace, prosperity and sustainability. A group of 7 students from Grade 5 - 10 attended this celebration. The celebration focused on the youth and the role the youth plays in creating a sustainable future and more equity in the world.





The Commonwealth was formed initially with countries that were former British colonies. The Commonwealth was formed initially "to foster international co-operation and trade links between people all over the world. Namibia joined the Commonwealth in 1990.

At the Commonwealth Day Celebrations, several countries from around the world who have missions in Namibia were in attendance: Namibia, Tanzania, Botswana, South Africa, Malaysia, Zambia, India, and Zambia.


This is Neuro-Diversity Week


Grade 4 - 12 WIS Students are invited to create and design the WIS Yearbook Cover for 2022-2023!
